

Our Security Challenge

Current and **Emerging Threats** in the **WMD** Space



- Pace & adaptability of **technological change**

- **Dual-use** chemical and pharmaceutical agents (which frustrate attribution)
- "Big computing" & machine learning

- Grey zone operations, and competition below the level of armed conflict
- Changing nature of "domain dominance"
- Opportunistic cooperation to counter U.S.
- Multi-domain, synchronous attacks
- Erosion of norms for CBRN use


DTRA was established to provide:



Enable Strategic Deterrence


Provide nuclear weapons sustainment and support to the Combatant Commands (CCMDs) and DoD



DTRA enhances partner nation capabilities to counter WMD and emerging threats, while building strong relationships for the United States globally






Identify Vulnerabilities and Mitigation Strategies

DTRA counters malign influence by providing <u>early and expert threat identification</u>, <u>analysis</u> and <u>leadership decision-space</u>




Worldwide Footprint

A Unique, Specialized Workforce




DTRA's workforce is an integrated mix of personnel from government, military, and industry, blending a variety of skillsets at the individual and organizational level.


